

Director's Dialogue:

The 54th Session of the Utah State Legislature proved fruitful for Utah's seven Associations of Government. Senator Mike Dmitrich sponsored and supported legislation to fund the Associations. A special thanks is extended to Senator Dmitrich for his continued efforts in working with the Associations of Government and sponsoring legislation to provide funding which supports our many endeavors.

Several southern Utah state legislators have been named to key committee assignments in both the Senate and House of Representatives for the 2001-2002 year.

Senator John W. "Bill" Hickman, District 29, chairs the Human Services Committee. In his first term as a State Senator, he will serve as vice-chair of the Joint Executive Appropriations Committee and also as a member of the Transportation/Public Safety Committee and the Public Education Subcommittee. Senate District 29 represents Iron County and the western half of W ashington County.

Senator Mike Dmitrich, District 27, represents portions of Carbon County, along with San Juan, Grand, Emery and Kane counties, and the eastern half of Washington County. He was named to serve on the Energy/Natural Resources & Agriculture Committee and the Revenue and Taxation Committee. He will also serve on the Joint Executive Appropriations Committee and the Capital Facilities and Administrative Services Subcommittee.

Senator Leonard Blackham, District 28, will serve as cochair for the Executive Appropriations. He will also serve as a member of the Energy, Natural Resources, and Agriculture and the Health and Environment Standing Committees. District 28 includes Juab, Sanpete, Sevier, Millard, Piute, Wayne, Beaver and Garfield counties.

Stephen H. Urquhard, newly elected State Representative in District 75, was named vice chair of the House Natural Resources, Agriculture and Environment Committee. He will also serve on the Higher Education Committee and Public Utilities and Technology Committee. District 75 takes in St. George and Winchester Hills.

Newly elected State Representative Dave Clark, District 74,

was named vice chair of the House Government Operations Committee. He will also be a member of the Joint Capital Facilities and Administrative Services Committee and the House Business, Labor and Economic Development Committee. District 74 covers the communities surrounding St. George, including the Bloomington Hills area and the east side of the East Black Ridge.

State Representative DeM ar "Bud" Bowm an, in District 72, will serve on the House Joint Capital Facilities and Administrative Services Committee. He also chairs the Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Standing Committee and serves as a member of the Government Operations Standing Committee. District 72 covers Beaver and Iron Counties.

State Representative Thom as Hatch, District 73, will serve on the House Public Education Committee and on the Business, Labor and Economic Development Standing Committee. He will also serve on the Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Committee. District 73 represents Beaver, Garfield, Kane, Piute, Sevier, Wayne, and Washington counties.

Congratulations to our southern Utah legislators on these appointments to key committees. (John S. Williams)

Iron County Ambulance Garage/EMT Training Facility

The Five County Association of Governments will be holding its regular April meeting of the Steering Committee at the Iron County Ambulance Garage/EMT Training facility. The facility is located at 201 East DL Sargent Drive, just east of the Iron County/Utah State Correctional Facility. The Steering Committee meeting begins at 1:00 p.m. on April 11, 2001 and will be held in the EMT training room.

This much needed public facility was completed in 1996 and includes approximately 1,800 square feet of climatecontrolled secure storage of Iron County ambulances. Prior to this facility's completion, ambulances in the Cedar City area were stored outside. Iron County ambulances began carrying temperature-sensitive intravenous (IV) solutions which need to be stored away from temperature extremes. This facility has provided for that need. In addition to the ambulance storage bay area, approximately 2,600 square feet containing an EMT training area and office space was constructed. The facility also includes a full kitchen area and restrooms. The facility is handicapped accessible. Additional future expansion/storage space is provided on the lower level of the facility under the training room area of the building.

This project was funded by Iron County with financial assistance of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Southwest Utah's 8th Annual Human Services Public Forums

The Five County Association of Governments' Human Services Council is pleased to announce the Eighth Annual Human Services Public Forums. The Forums started several years ago as a requirement of the Community Services Block Grant Program to solicit input from low income individuals regarding human service needs. These Human Service Forums have been expanded in order to bring people from all facets of the community together to discuss, prioritize and provide input regarding the needs of their local community. The information gathered at these forums is used by the Human Services Coordinator in the development of a 3-year plan. In addition, the information is used by the Human Services Council, the advisory board to the Steering Committee of the AOG, in determining prioritization for discretionary human services funding within the Five Counties; as well as by other agencies throughout the area for planning and program develop men t.

In conjunction with the public forums, a needs assessment questionnaire is completed by participants and others in the community. The questionnaire provides statistical data that can be used by Five County and other agencies in looking at the needs of the community, identifying gaps, prioritizing where linkages can be made and assisting with resource development.
